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**'Making a Murderer' Season 2 coming in October**

The much-anticipated second season of "Making a Murderer," a docu-series that brought worldwide attention to the murder cases of Wisconsin's Steven Avery and his nephew Brendan Dassey, will be released by Netflix on Oct. 19.

Netflix made the announcement via Twitter on Tuesday. The first season was released in December 2015 and brought international attention to the cases, leaving many with the impression that Avery and Dassey were wrongfully convicted of the 2005 murder of photographer Teresa Halbach. The specter of police misconduct is present throughout the first season, particularly as it relates to the Manitowoc County Sheriff's Department.

Over the course of 10 new episodes, "Making a Murderer" Part 2 provides an in-depth look at the high-stakes post-conviction process, exploring the emotional toll the process takes on all involved," Netflix said in a statement. Filmmakers Laura Ricciardi and Moira Demos, who created the first Emmy Award-winning season, return in the second season.

**School stress is real. Here's how kids cope.**

School is hard. Adults don't always remember it that way, but it is. "I've actually been trying to avoid the thought of," Jose Morales said about school stress. "I get really stressed about it and would up, just thinking about everything that comes along with junior year."

In text messages to the HOPELINE, a crisis text line (text 741-741), teens shared some of that stress with professionals. The messages were provided to USA TODAY NETWORK-Wisconsin without identifying details.

*I just don't fit in. I am trying but I just don't fit in. I feel like a loner. Everybody else seems to have it all together, but I struggle every day and it gets harder every day.*

*These tests we have to take stress me out. I go blank when I look at the paper.*

*I just can't keep up with school and then I also work and everything else... It is just too much.*

USA TODAY NETWORK-Wisconsin reported on data showing youth suicide attempts and self-harm hospitalizations decline in the summer and begin to rise during the school year. In a new episode of the podcast "This is Normal," we hear from Jose Morales and other teens about how school stress bears on them — and what we can all do to help.

For Jose, a junior at Xavier High School in Appleton, school stress last year led him to contemplate suicide. He was hospitalized when his mother found the evidence. But that also led him to get help, change schools, and to

"There is so much to the story that isn't being shown, I really wish this documentary was unbiased," Valdes resident Miranda Schwegel told USA TODAY NETWORK-Wisconsin.

Since the first season of "Making a Murderer," the U.S. Supreme Court rejected Dassay's request for review, and Avery continues to seek a new trial in the Wisconsin appeals system.

"This case is what being a lawyer is all about," tweeted the Center for Wrongful Convictions of York University, which is representing Dassay.

American criminal justice," Ricciardi and Dennis said in a Netflix statement.

But detractors claimed the first season was a one-sided TV show that unnecessarily opened wounds and subjected law enforcement officials and on-river community to undeserved scrutiny and ridicule.

Still, there's no disputing that the impact of the first season has been far-reaching.

It has been a rallying cry for wrongful conviction centers and innocence projects across the U.S., and it focused attention on false confessions and interrogation of juveniles.

The first season made near-instant celebrities out of Avery's trial attorneys, Dean Strang and Jerome Buting. It also made villains out of some Manitowoc County investigators and former Calumet County District Attorney Ken Kratz.

It also led to an outpouring of criticism for attorney Len Kachinsky, who represented Dassay for a short time before being removed by a judge for allowing Dassay, who was 16 at the time of Halbach's murder, to be interviewed by investigators without legal representation.

Kachinsky told USA TODAY NETWORK-Wisconsin on Tuesday that he understood why the jurors convicted Dassay in 2007, and said neither stands a good chance of getting out of prison.

Zellner's grandiose predictions haven't panned out so far, he said.

Kachinsky, who was interviewed at his Fox Crossing home for season 2 of the docu-series, isn't sure what kind of reaction to expect when the new episodes show up on Netflix. But he's confident it will be one-sided in favor of Avery and Dassay.

"I expect this to be more of the same," he said. "There is something of a cottage industry to prove that Avery and Dassay were not involved in the Halbach homicide."
